The word Ontoars ['n-TWAR-suh,' the turning' or' spinning' dance] is a synonym for the more common dance word Onv,rtit; as a matter of fact, the dance described here is also called On, rtit in some parts of the Banat area. It is a dance Dick learned from Romanian immigrants in his home town of St. Paul, Minnesota during his childhood.

Meter: 2/4

Formation: Couples, partners face to face, randomly scattered about the dancing area. Initial position is W's hands on M's shoulders, M's R hand at W's L shoulder

blade, his L hand on her upper R arm. For other positions, see below.

Meas Count Action

Note: Footwork is identical for M and W throughout this dance.

PART 1 - Cross steps

Step Rft across in front of Lft, couple rotates slightly CW. 2

Step Lft to Lft into an "apart" position of feet.

Abruptly shift weight onto Rft to R, at the same time M "tosses" W across in front to his L, catching her with his L hand at her R shoulder blade, and places his R hand on her L upper arm (reversed position to that described above Formation)

This alternating hand switching by the M is used throughout the dance.

3-4 Repeat movements of meas 1-2 with opposite footwork and

direction.

5-16 Repeat movements of meas 1-4 three more times (total 4).

PART 2 - Turning

17 Step Rft across in front of Lft, couple begins rotation CW.

18-19 4 steps (2 steps per meas), LR/LR, couple rotating CW.

Same movements as in meas 2 of Part I. 20

21-24 Repeat movements of meas 17-20 with opposite footwork and

direction.

Repeat movements of meas 17-24 once more. 25-32
