Pasadena Co-op

The Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op will present its 23rd. annual folk dance festival at the Glendale Civic Auditorium, Sunday January 26, from 1 to 5:30 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Folk Dance Federation of California, South. This year's theme is "Fantasy Festival". We may expect to find the usual fine program and excellent exhibitions always associated with Pasadena Co-op's festivals. For those members of the Federation Council, that meeting will take place at 11 a.m. In order to be through in time, President Alice Hauserman has urged all delegates to please be prompt in attendance.

It seems very appropriate that this, the first festival of the new year, should be hosted by the Pasadena group, since it is one of the oldest continuing folk dance groups in this area. It was organized way back in the fall of 1941 by Sid Gottlieb, an ardent folk dancer and doctoral candidate at Caltech, and the nucleus consisted

of students and teachers from the college as well as a number of interested people from the Friends Society. This antedates both sections of the Folk Dance Federation. Pasadena, one of the charter clubs, was privileged to have one of its own presidents, Allen Pelton, serve as first Southern Section president.

In the spring of 1942, a constitution was formally adopted, based on the principles of the Rochdale Co-operatives, open membership and democratic control, and in the intervening years, to a non-profit basis. However, the ideals of the Rochdale principles remain as firm a part of the Pasadena Co-op philosophy as ever.

In those early years, versatility and adaptability were the watchwords. A very limited number of folk dance records were available then, but the club was fortunate in having Mrs. Amlin at the piano to provide music; thus Pasadena was usually the first club to have many dances, as repertoire was limited only by the availability of sheet music. And though "hi-fi" was yet a decade away, there was no dearth of audio equipment, for with its huge reservoir of "electronic talent" represented by its Caltech membership, it was second to none.

The first festivals, held on the grass, at local parks, necessitated a rather lively program in winter months - to help prevent the dancers' blood from congealing. How many remember the traditional Pasadenan "Contras" and "Longways"?

So again, you are welcomed to "Fantasy Festival". We hope you have an enjoyable time, and would also like to see you any Friday night at our group in Pasadena WYCA gym, 78 N. Marengo.

Statewide '69 is only five months away and the time for registration is definitely arrived.
