MENDOCINO WOODLANDS CAMP IN DANGER

A surprise parade occurred in Mendocino on Saturday afternoon, June 29th, as singers, dancers and musicians from the Mendocino Folklore Camp came to town to dramatize the plight of the Mendocino Woodlands Camp Association. The Association is in danger of losing its state lease on 288 acres of forest land and camp facilities, eleven miles east of Mendocino.

The group assembled on Main Street, and soon the rhythms of Bulgarian, Norwegian, Croatian, Irish and Romanian music were drawing the attention of passers-by. Banjo pickin and clogging took the group to the Mendocino Hotel where they presented an impromptu concert. After more singing, the group returned to the Woodlands Camp.

Each June for the past ten years a folklore camp has been held at the Mendocino Woodlands Camp; many cultures have been taught. The Woodlands Camp is administered by a non-profit association of the Folklore Camp, Pacific Central District of the Unitarian Church, Camp Fire Girls, 4-H Clubs, and Jack and Jill. Historically, the Association has been pressed for funds, but is now facing the serious threat of closure by the state and reversion of the land to forestry management (this means the redwood trees would be logged). The combination of expensive maintenance requirements and a decrease in rentals made to the incomplete the serious that the incomplete the serious the serious that the incomplete the serious the serious threat the incomplete the serious the serious threat threat the serious threat thre short in their budget. This amount must be raised or pledged by October 1st to insure the preservation of the beautiful woodland setting and the continuation of programs at the camp.

There are many ways for small groups to raise money: musicians and dancers can perform at art fairs, high school assemblies, conventions, shopping complexes, and even on busy street corners or plazas (live music and costuming are musts in these situations). Larger groups can produce benefit institutes, international food faires and craft displays, raffles, concerts, and benefit parties.

One extremely important way of sustaining the life of this woodland camp is to solicit organized groups to rent and use the camp's facilities, which include cabins with fireplaces, dining and recreation halls, pool, hiking trails and river swimming. There is abundant wildlife and especially rich botanical specimens which would provide ample study material for science or conservation groups; there are open campsites which are excellent for large groups of young campers; music seminar groups would find the solitude they need. campers; music seminar groups would find the solitude they need. And all of this is available at very reasonable prices for groups of from 30 to 450 persons.

Hopefully this camp can not only be continued, but expanded to allow many more dancers, folklore enthusiasts, and others to participate in this unique and rewarding camping experience.

SPECIAL EVENTS

36TH NATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL

Some of America's best traditional dancers and musicians will participate in the 36th Annual National Folk Festival, August 1-4, at Wolf Trap Farm Park in Vienna, Virginia, which is located not far from Washington, across the Potomac. Wolf Trap Farm is the first National Park dedicated to the presentation and preservation of the cultural performing arts.

The festival will begin with Children's Day on Thursday, August 1, at noon, and will include special music, games, dances and puppetry shows especially geared for the youngsters. Later that evening, the architecturally beautiful Filene Center will come alive with the first concert of the weekend when, at 8 p.m., scores of performers, in groups, combos and soloists, will present traditional music and dance. These concerts will be seen, with different casts of course, each evening during the festival.

Wooded rolling hills and meadows of the Park itself will frame the sounds of free workshops and mini-concerts from 11 in the morning to 5 in the afternoon Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Between the conclusion of each afternoon of workshops and the evening concert, activities shift to dancing to bands with live music from various cultures, and the entire audience is induced to join the fun of an old fashioned "dance-party". Of course, one must eat sometime in-between, and there are concessionaires, but most people will prefer to bring their own picnic suppers. Have you ever enjoyed the pleasure of a picnic with family or friends on an early summer evening in a cool, green meadow of Northern Virginia? I have!

The workshops, the dance parties, and the Children's Day events are all free - and the admission to the evening concerts at Filene Center have a top price of \$3 each. The crafts portions of the workshops include construction and repair of such musical instruments as the dulcimer, guitar and fiddle - a drum maker - woodcarvers of various backgrounds, including some of America's master Indian craftsmen. Singers and balladeers from Arkansas, Scotland, Arizona - blues singers from the Carolinas - and black jazz singers from the South and Mid-West will be present. Glenn Bannerman and family will present their clogging, and the Louisiana Aces, their Cajum two-steps, and yes, there'll even be music and dance with a Balkan emphasis this year. This annual event is sponsored by the National Folk Festival Association. Seems like a great way to start off the month of August.

NORTHWEST FESTIVAL AT ENUMCLAW

The 25th Annual Northwest Folk Dance Festival - Enumclaw, Washington - August 24 and 25! What is it all about? Think of dancing in the fresh breezes of the North Pacific on the edge of an Alpine wilderness of idyllic splendor. Picture yourself wending your way past snowy peaks, craggy pinnacles, cascading falls and hanging valleys filled with flowers. Acquaint yourselves with Enumclaw which was settled in the 1860's and 1870's by emigrants from Slovenia and Scandinavia, enjoy its Old World attractiveness, and note how untouched it is by industry and adverse ecological factors. Paradoxically, it lies only one hour southeast of Seattle. It is an ideal location for a folk dance festival. Each year, folk dancers from the huge area which is comprised of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, western Montana, British Columbia and Alaska assemble on the fourth weekend in August to enjoy their largest and oldest event. It is hosted by the Enumclaw Glacier Gliders and sponsored by the area parent organization, the Northwest Folkdancers, Inc.

The two-day event offers the possibility of 20½ hours of dancing. Included are a Saturday night festival dance, and another one on Sunday afternoon; a re-institute of favorite dances; an institute for intermediate level dancers and another one for advanced dancers. This year, Nena Sokčić, formerly of Lado, will be the featured instructor. Also included are a kolo hour, a dance concert with exhibitions, and a Croatian song session. In addition there will be two 'Hoot Owls', which is a local term for afterparties - one, a Balkan Hoot Owl, and the other, an international Hoot Owl. These post-midnight dances will be held in two rustic halls which have been built adjacent to one another in the middle of a meadow. Dancers may move freely between the two parties. On Sunday afternoon, the festival will be concluded with a traditional water-melon feed for all participants.

What is the tab for this dance-filled weekend? A cool, refreshing \$4 for adults and \$3 for juniors. Reduced prices are made for those who hold membership in the Northwest Folkdancers, Inc. Not included in the admission, however, is the festival banquet which will be held at Nedja's under the supervision of a descendant of one of Enumclaw's Slovenian pioneers. 'OLD SPANISH DAYS', the Santa Barbara Fiesta, usually starts on or about a Wednesday, earlyish in August. If it follows the format of the past 25 to 50 years (there have been changes from time to time), and to some degree for 138 years prior to that, it will, we hope, again occur this month. It should start with a series of parades in fiesta costumes down State Street, include a daily carnival, and an official opening ceremony with Powers-that-be on the steps of the famous old mission that evening. During the course of the four days following, there should be numerous parades, generally in costume - a rodeo - singers and dancers, both at the gardens of the courthouse and outdoors at the waterfront - and displays of artcraft and techniques. There has usually been a folk dance festival, hosted by the Santa Barbara Folk Dancers * at Santa Barbara High School in the boys' gym, East Anapamu St., on Saturday evening. One might check with members of the Santa Barbara dance groups for further information on this particular aspect of the fiesta week, or with the Chamber of Commerce concerning the fiesta as a whole - dates, times, and any special activities at the Lobero Theatre.

THE TAMBURITZA EXTRAVAGANZA at the International Hotel near L. A. International Airport will be the 8th annual event of this kind. The dates are Friday and Saturday, August 9 and 10, and it will be a festival-concert featuring, at last report, some 25 of the major tamburitza bands of the United States and Canada. Whether or not there will be any dancing following the concert to live music we do not know. Many of the orchestras, or members of some of them, will also make their appearance at the Croatian National Hall on South Budlong the following day, Sunday. Here again, we don't know what the dance situation will be. But dancing or no, lovers of the live orchestral folk music of Yugoslavia will find this very entertaining, for these groups are in competition. Then, as the evening draws on and the pivo and slivovitza take hold, one may find oneself joining in the chorus of such old traditional standbys as 'Marijana', 'Addio Mare', 'Sumadia' or 'Tamo Daleko'.

IN TUNE WITH OUR COVER, fiddling around the country, August is loaded with Americana folk events. Besides the Wolf Trap Farm Festival, there is the traditional Old Time Fiddlers' Convention in Galax, Virginia; the Fox Hollow Family Festival in Petersburg, New York; and the Philadelphia Folk Festival in Schwenksville, Pennsylvania. The famed Georgia Mountain Fair is in Hiawasee, also in late August. We have no dates, but there are Indian pow-wows and ceremonials at Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota (the Oglala Sun Dance); one in Sheridan, Wyoming; the 43rd Annual Indian Exposition in Andarko, Oklahoma; the Narragansett Tribal Ceremony in Charlestown, Rhode Island & Providence Plantations; and the Pow-wow in Tama, Iowa.

Organized folk dancing came to the West San Fernando Valley in 1959, when six long-time dancers, the Peltons, the Zwicks and the Mintons, organized the West Valley Folk Dance Club. We met in the auditorium of the Canoga Park Elementary School, Topanga Canyon Boulevard at Cohasset (just south of Saticoy). Our membership was very small for a number of years, but recently has grown to an all-time high of 75. We have considered moving to larger quarters but can't find a floor to match our good raised foundation, or a custodian the equal of our most helpful and friendly Russell Rouse.

Our club is a co-operative in every sense of the word, with members providing most of the teaching program. A beginners' class series is offered twice a year by long-time members Walter and Lottie Philipp. Since the West Valley is very much a family area, we have often provided a summer class for our children so that they can dance with us, in time, and several of them have become very accomplished dancers.

We maintain a small exhibition group which presents programs for such local groups as the Kidney Foundation and the Jewish Home for the Aged.

The biggest fringe benefit to belonging to our club is getting to attend our terrific parties. We rent a dance studio with a beautiful floor for our annual Anniversary and New Year's Eve buffet supper and dances, and in the summer take advantage of the lovely Valley evenings to dance on various members' spacious patios.

We know that many dancers have moved to the San Fernando Valley over the years and may find it hard to drive long distances back to their original home clubs. We hope that they will find their way on Friday nights at 7:15 p.m. to visit us.
