CLUB OF THE MONTH CLUB

BETYÁROK

This is a short history of the Betyarok Hungarian Performing Group, featured on the cover of this month's "Folk Dance Scene". 'Betyar' means a sort of mischievous lad, or outlaw - in a non-malicious way.

In 1966, after one of Andor Czompo's rare teaching sessions in Southern California, four fellows got together for the purpose of practicing and enjoying the special men's dances that Andor had been teaching - Don Green, Anthony Ivancich, Dick Oakes and John Tiffany. They all worked hard and diligently for almost a year before giving their first public performance.

As time went on and the repertoire of Betyarok grew, the men found that these dances for men, done consecutively, such as in a suite, were quite exhausting, so, after considerable deliberation - and some hesitation - the decision was finally made to allow girls into the group, which would enable them to present couple dances and dances for women.

As performance opportunities grew, Elsie Dunin was invited to become director. Elsie, as most of you are aware, is with the Dance Department of UCLA and directs that University's fine Yugoslav Performing Group also. With Betyárok, she arranges the material taught by Andor Czompo, all of which originated in Hungary. Probably a majority of the Hungarian dances done at the folk dance clubs and at their festivals in California were introduced by Andor at one or the other of the folk dance camps or institutes, and those which Betyarok performs are the ones which, as exhibition material, are of a caliber to test the mettle of this fine group of dancers. Elsie, an outstanding teacher of dance, is especially qualified to direct this group since she has spent some time in Hungary learning and researching Hungarian folk dance and customs.

The performing group now consists of some eight or nine couples, hailing from Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura counties. In the past years, Betyárok has performed for the ethnic Hungarian community at its fairs and balls, as well as at folk dance festivals all over California. Its performances have also been enjoyed by audiences at the Wilshire-Ebell, the United European-American Club, the Phoenix Club, Busch Gardens, the American Guild of Organists, and three Choreographers' Concerts at California State University of Fullerton. Its latest performance was at the Westwood Co-op Festival in April. At the Statewide Festival in Santa Maria, Betyárok will be premiering new material in a suite of dances from Transylvania.

THE FOLK MEDIA

Here we have another addition to our folk fourth estate via the medium of the electronic media. It is a small but powerful station in Inglewood, K T Y M, operating on the 1460 AM frequency on your radio.

Ethnic and international programming is limited to Saturdays and Sundays - the balance of the week is standard operating procedure for small stations - news, rock, religion, and the usual topics. However, if you tune in bright and early on a Saturday morning, you will find yourself listening to someone speaking in a strange tongue, or perhaps hear some distinctly non-American music. We do not have their schedule, but it seems that it begins with a Japanese program. Then, during the day, we have a little bit of everything. As the manager said when we were talking to him - "..you name it, we've got it - European, Asian, Black, Latin, Country...." They started some years ago with the thought in mind to give a common outlet for the many nationalities comprising Los Angeles' ethnic area to enable them to meet through an audial, if not physical contact, and to get to know each other's cultures.

Most announcements are in both the language of the program involved and in English. It can be rather interesting to, after listening to some familiar kolo, hear the announcer speak and say "...telefonu sedam tri sedam pyet tre etc. etc..." You just know that he is telling the audience that they can get the record from John. The Armenian hours are very interesting. They seem to always be telling of some Armenian picnic taking place. Lithuanians follow Russians, and the German hour, if we recall rightly, is sandwiched between the Italian and the Jewish hours. There are also some very good Black and Latin American programs. You can often put two and two together, even if you don't know the language well, and come up with the location of some nationality restaurant during the commercials, if you're gourmet-inclined.

A lot of the material is talk, but K T Y M doe not encourage - in fact it discourages politics and controversies. There is a lot of singing of semi-popular songs and classical music. Don't be surprised to find a lot of Strauss on one of the German programs, for Germans like Strauss sp that's what the sponsors give them! If you're driving around the Los Angeles area shopping on a Saturday or Sunday, set your car radio button for 1460 kc - forget that news and those sigalerts - the music and dances you'll hear is much more enjoyable!

INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE IN JAPAN



(We are indebted to Mr. Hironobu Senzaki of Tokyo for the following article. At his request, we have made minor corrections and translations, and rearranged in chronological sequence where necessary. This is the story of international folk dancing in Japan since 1946, as well as that of Mr. Senzaki himself and of his group.)

* * * * * *

First, I will introduce my group (I'm the director). It is named Xopo, and we have about thirty members. We dance every Sunday evening. Although almost every folk dance group in Japan does international dancing, my group is one that does only dances of the Balkans, Asia Minor and the Near East.

We will first concern ourselves with the Balkan dance situation. In 1959, the Ensemble Kolo from Beograd came, and Balkan dance history in Japan got started. As I myself didn't start folk dancing until 1964, I don't know the details of the epoch of Balkan dance in Japan between these years. However, I did dance some Balkan dances when I started, and during the next four to five years, I danced many more, including the "Serbian Medleys", "Hop Sai Sa Sa", "Kalajdzijsko", "Zetsko", "Uzička Čarlama", "Setnja", "Veliko", "Gankino", "Daičovo", the Greek "Tsamikos", "Bavno", "Lesnoto", "Jovano Jovanke", "Alunelul" and others. Probably between 70 and 80 Balkan dances were done in this period, mostly, as you see, Yugoslavian and Bulgarian.

The next epoch came in 1969 when Mr. Cavit Kangoz - he is Turkish - visited Japan. He taught us about fifty more dances, both Turkish and others, including "Papuri", "Poltakai", "Cepliki", "Sadilo Mome", "Ruka", "Zorba's Dance", "Sirba Munteneasca", "Arap", "Pajduško", the "Syrtos", etc.

In 1970, during Expo '70, many international ensembles came. However, I have no details for we wanted no 'ensemble dances'. We had no teachers coming at this time, so we danced many dances which we learned from written dance descriptions. We know this is not too satisfactory but, under the circumstances, had no other choice.

In January, 1972, I went to the United States, and danced at Michael Herman's class in New York and at Zitsa, the Carrousels, and Mandala Center in San Francisco. On this tour, I was happy to meet Michael and Mary Ann Herman, Joe Hammer, Grace Nicholes, Mr. and Mrs. John Pappas, Dean and Nancy Linscott and Neal Sandler. The following year, 1973, I went to Pece Atanasovski's camp in Otesevo, Yugoslavia, and also saw the Balkan festival at Ohrid, Smotra Folklora in Zagreb, and the Dora Stratou Theatre in Athens. We learned dances there, and at the Athens Intersection. These dances we brought back to learn at our groups in Japan. That was a very Balkan year, for later on Kolo returned to Japan for a tour.

In the summer of 1974, Bora Ozkok came to Japan en route to his home in Turkey and taught us about thirty different Turkish, Armenian and Assyrian dances. He stayed at my home and we had much conversation about folk dancing. It was from him that I heard about "Folk Dance Scene". Another big epoch that year was the first Balkan Festival in Japan at Nagoya. I was invited to be one of the teachers at the Institute and taught several dances. This year, 1975, we have had the 2nd Balkan Festival where Miss Jane Wieman (now living in Osaka) taught us such varied dances as "Petrunino Horo", "Dzangurica", "Jambolsko Pajduško", "Baiereasca", "Nestinarsko" and "Povrateno". Again, I taught several Bulgarian and Turkish dances. Later on this year, we have a big event coming, when Yves Moreau will present his first workshop in Japan.

I cannot tell too much about international dancing in general in Japan, but I can give you a few highlights. In 1946, Mr. Winfield Niblo started teaching American square dancing in Nagasaki. During this period and for the next ten years,

many teachers, mostly American, stayed and taught American and international folk dances - some of whom were Mr. E. R. Backley, Mr. and Mrs. Posner, Carl L. Stuart, Mr. and Mrs. Kiethly and Miss Leica. In 1956, Mr. Herman's group came - Mr. and Mrs. Herman, Nelda Lindsey, Jane Farwell and Ralph Page. The next year, 1957, Ricky Holden visited and the Folk Dance Federation of Japan got started.

Two ensembles appeared in 1959 - Kolo, as I already mentioned, and Moiseyev. Mr. Holden returned in 1960, and in 1962, Mr. and Mrs. Wills (he was former editor of "Let's Dance"). Israel's noted Gurit Kadman was here in 1963 to show the new dances of

Israel, and in 1967, Henryc Duda and his Polish Dance Ensemble came. He taught us some Polish dances at that time. (We have already spoken of Cavit Kangoz' visit in 1969 and the dance groups at Expo '70;) In 1971, Nelda Drury came here and she was followed the next year by Mr. Csaba Palfi who taught Hungarian dancing. The same year, our Folklore Festival was presented. Ensemble Kolo returned once more in 1973; then, last year, besides Bora Özkök, we had Csaba Palfi visit once more, and Jane Wieman, who is staying here. (This is a list of important visitors and dates to show the progress of international folk dance in our country).



We also have some organizations. However, Xopo has not joined any of them. The Folk Dance Federation of Japan, Inc. is a social-educational organization. Sometimes they plan folk dance tours, workshops and parties, and almost every other group and organization is joined to it. Most folk dance groups in Japan are very social-education oriented, and very few groups do dancing for dancing alone and for themselves. Xopo is one of this latter, Please pardon me that I cannot tell you more about folk dancing in Japan and must say so much about my group and myself only. I enclose some photographs of Xopo, and a party program.

SPECIAL EVENTS SANTA MARIA FIESTA '75



Well, we are finally getting down to the wire, so to speak. If you have been keeping track of our previous issues, you should have a rather complete idea of (to use an apparently current popular phrase) "what it's all about", said "it" being Statewide, or Fiesta '75.

Chairman Audrey Silva has sent us along some additional information, and this, with what we have obtained from other committeepeople, follows, with a few editorial interpolations.

Most of the Statewide committee is working very hard to bring this fine festival to all of our Californian folk dancers (and dancers from wherever else are also most welcome - we hope you can make it!). Santa Maria is a brand new area for Statewide - in fact, almost a brand new one for folk dance festivals in general. The location is superb - a most charming town, in a beautiful valley, with friendly people, geographically ideal as it is situated equidistant from the northernmost and southernest folk dance groups, and the time of the year will see the California countryside and weather, we hope, at its best.

What we hadn't discussed previously was the matter of the Institute. Now we have this info. One of the teachers will be Dick Crum. He is the well known authority on Balkan dance, with a wealth of material from all parts of Yugoslavia as well as Bułgaria, Romania and the surrounding lands. He has taught at many camps and institutes throughout the United States, and was formerly associated with the Duquesne Tamburitzans of Pittsburgh. Dick will be teaching Balkan line dances at the Institute, and the Statewide committee is very proud to have him as one of our instructors for the afternoon.

The other teacher, new to almost everyone, is Manuel Alberto Martins. He hails from the Açores Islands and is now making his home in Santa Maria with his wife and three children. He is State President of the Portuguese 20-30 Luso-American Club. He will be teaching and calling a Portuguese "Chamarita" in the style of his home island of Fayal. There are many calls and styles - all depending upon which particular island or town the caller hails from. The word "Chama-rita" means to call Rita, and is a style of dance rather than the name of a specific one. It is a delightful couple-mixer, with a caller who always dances with the people rather than in the manner of a square dance caller. Leaders who perfect their calls seldom make commands in the same order every time; therefore, one of the very first rules of the dance is - keep your eyes on the caller! We are most happy to be able to introduce this new teaching personality to our Californian dance circles, with a dance from a folk dance area in which our repertoire is fairly limited.

The two afterparties on Saturday and Sunday nights, midnight to three a.m., will be chaired by Anthony Ivancich, and his Westwind Ensemble will provide live music for dancing. Exhibitions will be seen during the Saturday evening and the Sunday afternoon and evening festivals, and there will be two segments at each time. So far those confirmed are Betyarok Hungarian Performing Group, the Cygany Dancers of San Diego, Ensemble Internationale of Sunnyvale, the Santa Barbara Folklore Ensemble, the Scottish Dance Ensemble, and the Terpsichoreans of San Francisco.

Here are some last minute directions to make it easier for your trip. There are five exits from the 101 Freeway, and the Stowell Road turnoff will take you directly to the Vandenburg Inn which is where you may register on Friday, 5-7 p.m., if you haven't already pre-registered. The installation brunch will also be held there at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday, and it is the Federation Convention headquarters. Stowell Road will also take you directly to the Convention Center. Go past the Vandenburg, cross Broadway to Thornburg, about ½ mile more, turn right and there you are! The Center is also within easy walking distance of the Vandenburg. Many excellent restaurants and breakfast houses exist in the immediate area. If you arrive after 8 p.m. on Friday, you will want to register at the Veterans Memorial Hall where the Friday night pre-party will be in session. In this case, the Main-Guadalupe exit will be easier. You should continue due west, through the center of town, to Pine Street (signal lights), turn right six blocks north on Pine, and you'll find the hall all lit up. This will also be the location for the midnight afterparties. If you arrive late and are hungering, you may get a snack there, as food will be catered by The Cooperage.

If your pre-registration is not in yet, hurry - for it isn't any fun standing in line. You have until May 10 to pre-register - and there is a registration form among the flyers in this issue of "Scene". If you have (or do) pre-register, your registration kit, with badge, receipt, admissions to whatever you've signed up for, etc., will be at the registration desk waiting for you. Remember, you <u>must</u> have the badge to attend any of the activities at Statewide.

A fine weekend of dance and enjoyment is awaiting you. Santa Maria is looking forward to meeting you and to hosting Statewide, Fiesta '75.

IDYLLWILD PRE-CONFERENCE PARTY

The Bacchanal is a semi-preview at which you may get a briefing from one or more of the instructors due at camp, an evening of enjoyable dancing, and an opportunity, through your donation at the door, to help provide camp scholarships to some deserving individual or individuals. The time is 7:30-11 p.m. on Saturday, May 3, and it will be at the West Hollywood Recreation Center, 647 San Vicente Blvd. in West Hollywood. All are cordially welcome.

INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL IN WEST COVINA

To "enjoy, enjoy" is the purpose of the International Folk Dance Festival slated for Sunday, June 1, at Temple Shalom, 1912 W. Merced, West Covina, and sponsored by Dance Center Internationale. The six hours of recreational folk dancing, which emphasizes participation but welcomes watchers, will begin at noon. Some instruction will be provided during the three two-hour segments led respectively by Ray Augustine (international), Paul Sheldon (international), and Ronnie Letvin (Israeli).

The East San Gabriel Valley location is easily accessible from the San Bernardino Freeway and convenient to the 605, 57, 210 and Pomona Freeways (see flyer this issue). Ample free parking, and food is available. Admission is \$2 for adults and $50\rlap/e$ for children.

Dance Center Internationale provides instruction and open dancing on the 4th Saturday evening of every month (except May, when it will be on the second one, May 10). It is held at Temple Shalom. 

FEDERATION IN FOCUS

S.O.S.! HELP FILL THE GAPS IN OUR ARCHIVES

Inasmuch as there hasn't been a Federation Council meeting since the last issue of "Scene", we'll go back to our subject of the Archives. As we've stated before, the purpose is to collect a complete set of important records - that is to say: dance descriptions, costume calendars, directories; "Scene" and "Let's Dance"; the syllabi of the Idyllwild and the Santa Barbara/San Diego Conferences, plus those of as many previous institutes that we can resurrect. These are for "posterity" and are to be housed in some public university library, accessable for research. In addition, we want to see that each committee and officers ip of the Federation has its own complete (as possible) set too, for its own reference and information. This includes minutes of its meetings. This is going to take some doing for inalmost every case, somewhere along the line of succession, there have been those who have either failed to carry out their mission or failed to pass along the material to their successors. These are the gaps which will have to be filled and we are asking our readers who may have boxes of no longer wanter folk dance-ana stashed away in their attics or garages, to help is by donating it.

Too immense a catalogue to list all at once, we are taking it part at a time. We've previously given you the listings of "Scene" and "Let'sDance" needed. Now for some of the others: Idyllwild Syllabus - we have 1953 through 1958, including (we think), all of the special week-ends during that period. Some recent ones may also be available, but at the moment, we can say that 1959 through 1973 are missing. . Costume calendars 1969 through 1972 are missing. These should not be too difficult to locate. . Directories have been imprinted on the face in two ways - such as '1949-1950', corresponding with the year of the tenure of office of the Federation officers, and '1973', denoting the last half year of officership. We are currently missing those for the "fiscal" years, 1949-50, 50-51, 53-54, 55-56, 62-62, 63-64, 66-67, and 72-73. Do you have any of these now defunct directories lying around and available? . . The Historian's books should NEVER have gotten misplaced, any more than should the official minutes of Federation business meetings. However, six big volumes of Federation history are not to be found. It could be that some historian was not on the job at the time, although in at least two of the cases listed below, I have actually seen the book subsequently to compilation so we know that those did and possibly still do exist. Missing are the years 1956-57, 57-58, 61-62, 69-70, 70-71 and 71-72. If you have seen any of these large volumes lying around, please let us know and we will try to retrieve them. We will appreciate anything you can do to help us fill these gaps in our archives. STATE SQUARE DANCE FESTIVALS are also scheduled for New Mexico, where the 28th Annual Festival will take place this week-end, May 2-3 in the Convention Center in Albuquerque, and in Nevada, where the Silver State Festival takes place, May 2-4 in the Centennial Coliseum in Reno. Also, another reminder that the big annual National Square Dance Convention will take place in Kansas City, Mo. June 26-28. Californians should be able to get the full information from Californian callers, Bruce Johnson, Lee Helsel, Arnie Kronenberger, Bill Peters, and Executive Secretary, Bob Osgood - all of whom are members of the Board of Governors of the International Association of Square Dance Callers.

A FOLLOW-UP of our item in March about the Callerlab Convention in Chicago. Some 565 callers and their spouses attended this event, the second sponsored by Callerlab, at the Marriott Hotel, March 24-26. Following a theme of "Time for Action", the callers, both local and nationally known, held discussions, heard speakers, and developed statements and ideas on some of the important issues of great concern to the square dance world. Items included the adoption of a new, updated list of square dance basics (to supplement, not substitute the current list); a resolution calling for the professional accreditation of those who teach square dance callers; and a defenite training curriculum. Finally, a 'code of ethics' for callers was established. "Milestone Awards" were trophies given to those four callers who have made a lasting contribution to the calling profession and to square dance activity. Bob Osgood of Los Angeles was appointed as the new Executive Secretary for 1975-76; Jim Mayo, chairman of the Board of Governors, and Stan Burdick was recognized for his outstanding service as Executive Secretary during the past year. It was agreed that Callerlab would again be presented at the Marriott in Chicago in April, next year.
