


(A letter to the editor from Steve Davis)

I would like to inform your readers about an ongoing activity in Santa Barbara which has a goal of revitalizing local folk dancing by reaching out to the contra dance community. For 3 Sundays in March, April and May (3/21, 4/18, 5/16), an hour of folk dance instruction has been (and is being) offered prior to the evening of contra dance. dancing has become very popular in Santa Barbara, with upwards of 100 dancers per evening. Some of these dancers have had prior folk dance experience, while others welcome the chance to learn a new form of dancing. If they like the folk dancing, they might decide to continue with our regular Wednesday night folk dancing!

The first evening, held in March, was an unqualified success. There were 35 people learning dances like Ersko Kolo, Alunelul, Setnja and Lesnoto. Linelle Glass, whose father, Buzz Glass, virtually started the folk dance movement in California, did the

STATEWIDE - The Concert

Director, Richard Duree, was given free rein. First, he came back with 8 performing groups, then it was 9, and the latest count is 11. Whoa, Richard! We're going to be overwhelmed by the most exciting Statewide Concert ever! The companies include Dunaj, Scandia, Polski Iskry, Francis Awe's Talking Drum Ensemble, Arpana, Toledano & Arbus, Kayamanan Ng Lahi, Terpsichoreans, Tanza (from the 32nd Street-US Magnet School), Koroyar, and the Viennese Waltz Demonstration Team.

The Statewide audience will see the Federation concert premiere of 5 groups. Master drummer, Francis Awe, is a prince of the Yoruba tribe in Nigeria. After receiving a degree from the University of Ife, working at the University of Lagos, and performing in several countries, he came to the U.S. in '83 to study at Cal Arts and UCLA. He's played in many concerts, festivals, and educational programs, and has been on TV. The dundun (talking drum) is hung from the shoulder and beaten with a curved stick; it emulates the tonal sounds of the Yoruba language. Dancer Omowale Orisayomi teaches West African dance classes. Arpana (East Indian) was described in the April issue. Kayamanan Ng Lahi (Treasures of Our People) was founded in '90 when Joel and Avecita Jacinto, who had danced with a UCLA student group and Ote'a in the early '80s and gone on research trips to the Philippines, got together here with a dancer and musical coordinator, both who had been with Bayanihan. The result is a large, active group, with new dancers drawn from the UCLA campus, which meets weekly for workshops presenting Philippine dance within a cultural context. The Terpsichoreans, based at St. Anthony's Orthodox Church in Pasadena, are the winners of the Sweepstakes Award at the '93 Greek folk Dance Festival competition for the western states. The Viennese Waltz dancers are from the Let's Dance Studio in Alhambra. The Australian contingent is their director, Shane Sinclair.

For more details on this 2-hour, multicultural extravaganza, simply attend the concert, held Saturday, May 29, at 1:30 p.m. Seating is on bleachers. There is no intermission. See the Statewide advance registration form; the concert is included in the \$32 package. The public is invited. General admission at the door is \$8, with youth admission at \$4 (ages 13-18). Children age 12 and under are free.

Statewide '93

Statewide '93 is a major landmark in folk dance history. Almost half a century after the Folk Dance Federation of California, South, sponsored its first Statewide Folk Dance Festival (1946), there will be live music included in the regular, planned-in-advance Saturday evening program (not an afterparty it's the main event)! Old-timers say this has never happened before. To mark the occasion, Miamon Miller's Tisa River Band has been engaged. A special celebration deserves a special group of musicians. They will also play at the after party on Sunday nite, starting at 9:30 p.m.

MIAMON MILLER was introduced to the violin at an early age; it was thus that his destiny was set in place. While majoring in Music Composition at UCLA, his career swerved in the ethnic direction when he took a class in Music of the Balkans, taught by members of In 1970 he joined the AMAN. company, and, on a 1973 research trip funded by an AMAN grant, he was introduced to and intrigued by the Romanian violin. He spent a year in Romania under a Fulbright grant. By 1983, he had served as AMAN's orchestra director, music director, and artistic director. Returning to UCLA, he earned an MA in Ethnomusicology in 1986, with a concentration in Romanian instrumental music. Fuge Imaginea orchestra has given concerts and made recordings, he's involved in instructional musical publishing and in the importation of ethnic instruments, and he is on the board of the East European Folklife Center, which sponsors the Balkan Music and Dance Camps at Mendocino and Buffalo Gap.

JIM KNIGHT grew up in the '60s in Santa Monica, playing with rock'n'roll bands. In '71, while traveling in Turkey as part of a crew making a documentary, he became enamored of the saz (a long-necked lute-like instrument); thus he began his affair with 'exotic' music. Under Arabic musicians, he studied the darabukke (a goblet-shaped drum played sideways) and the oud (a short-necked, fretless double-strung lute). At UCLA in '79, while demonstrating to Prof. Jihad Racy's Ethnomusicology students, Jim was spotted by Miamon Miller and tapped to join the AMAN orchestra. Since then he has mastered a variety of instruments, including the brač in the tamburica group, the Transylvanian brácsa (a viola converted into a chord fiddle), Mexican bihuela (a tiny guitar), Cajun guitar - whatever's required by AMAN's ever-unfolding repertoire. Jim is also a performer and arranger in the Kárpátok Orchestra and has been the music coordinator at the Bárstag Hungarian Camp. At Statewide, he'll most likely play guitar, viola, and percussion.

VIC KOLER has been a musician for 36 years, having started at age 5 with a tamburica (though he's of Macedonian parentage). Growing up in Cleveland, he became proficient on the prim, brač, and čelović tamburica types and was with the Lira Tamburitzans. In Miami, Florida, he received a degree in Studio Music and Jazz, and played bass in salsa bands from '76-'86. As a full-time AMAN musician, Vic has been in many theatre concerts and countless school shows. He also plays electric bass with the Merak Macedonian Gypsy Band and is their primary arranger. This versatile musician also does some klezmer and is Music Director of the West African World Beat Band, Kadara. At Statewide, he'll play acoustic bass.

DON SPARKS possesses an unusual degree of artistic flexibility. He leaps with ease between the dance and music areas of the stage -- a sort of Superman of the folk world. His first encounter with international folk dance was at Cal Tech in '75. That propelled him into Mihai David's Bessarabia group, the Intersection Dancers, The Ukranian Spirit Company, and AVAZ. He was also the co-founder of Gypsy. Don's AMAN experience started in '77 and includes serving as dancer, choreographer, men's dance director, vocal soloist, musician, music coordinator and, most recently, as associate artistic director. On trips to Transylvania, he did field research in both dance and music. Folk ensembles in Utah and Alaska have called on him for choreographies and musical arrangements, and he has guested with the ballet companies of six western states. In the Pasadena dance Theatre's annual Nutcracker production, he can be seen in the Russian trio. He has played in the orchestras of Stockton, Mendocino Folklore and Balkan camps, and has been music coordinator for Bárátsag Camp the past 3 years, and is the leader of the local táncház band. His Statewide instruments will be prim tamburica, accordion, violin, and maybe viola.

That's the Tisa River Band. Now, the question is, where is the Tisa River? To Miamon, it is in Romania, where it borders on Ukrania. To others, it is in Hungary and is the Tisza River. Still others may say the Tisa is in the former Yugoslavia. All are correct. It is all one river. At Statewide, music will flow through the air as the Tisa/Tisza/Tisa flows through villages where once upon a time the folk danced into the night as musicians played this same music. Go with the flow.

Ethnology Forum and World Dance Concert

On the weekend of February 12, 1993, the University of California at Los Angeles held its 14th annual Dance Ethnology Forum. Produced by members of the Graduate Dance Ethnology Association, the Forum serves as a platform for the intercultural understanding of dance as an integral part of cultural behavior while providing an opportunity for current research to be publicly presented for professional feedback. Attended by local, national and international scholars, the event has become an increasingly popular academic conference for the field of Dance Ethnology in the U.S.A.

In light of recent international political unrest and major social changes, the UCLA Dance Ethnology Association chose "preservation, restoration, and change" as this year's theme to encapsulate the attitude in selected world areas toward the preservation of culture, specifically dance. Since one of the primary goals of dance ethnology is to document dances in their changing socio-political environments, creating an awareness of issues pertaining to the preservation, restoration and change of dance becomes vital for determining methodologies for the future study of dance. Needless to say, this year's theme stimulated a response unprecedented by previous years, with the Dance Department receiving more abstract submissions than ever before.

The 2 1/2 day program consisted of a variety of oral presentations and dance demonstrations based on recent research findings. Friday afternoon opened with the presentation of 6 papers, ranging in topic from "Bringing dance into the information age" to the poetics of East Indian Kathak dancing.


Salpuri is a traditional Korean dance. Origin performed by the oldest shamen, Salpuri was lized in exorcisms. Improvisational in nature dance is accompanied by ritualistic shamen ma With a schedule full of papers, demonstrations and performances, Saturday was the best attended day of the Forum. Phylise Smith began a section devoted specifically to African and African-American dance by discussing "Current styles in West African hip-hop dances" and showing brilliant footage of a West African dance festival. This was followed by 2 additional papers addressing "The Negro primitive and modern dance" and "Recreating cultural memory of Ghanian-American dance."

The second half of the Saturday morning program consisted of two Hungarian dance exhibitions. The first was a Hungarian national dance from the village area of Kalocsai performed by the Karpatok Hungarian Folk Ensemble. The women were brilliantly outfitted in traditional Hungarian costumes with intricately sewn open-backed slippers and finely embroidered aprons cascading over a seemingly infinite number of petticoats. The couples danced in time to lively Hungarian melodies, with skirts whirling out as the men in their sturdy Hungarian boots lifted and spun them while slapping precise, audible rhythms for the audience. The dance was followed by a musical interlude in which Don Sparks played the hurdy-gurdy, a traditional Hungarian wind instrument. In sharp contrast, the second dance performed was a Transylvanian Mesosegi "dance cycle", characteristic of the numerous peasant dances currently existing in Transylvania. This area, once a part of Hungary and now a part of Romania, is heavily populated by ethnic Hungarians who have carried on their dance culture. The piece was choreographed by Estvan "Kovacs" Szabo, a former member of the Hungarian State Ensemble. After opening with the traditional men's dance, two couples danced to live music arranged by accomplished ethnomusicologist, David Skuse. This section of the Forum was accented by a discussion panel aimed at exploring the transmission of Hungarian folk dance to the U.S.A. as it relates to the issue of "preservation, restoration, and change." Included in the issues raised during the panel discussions was the role of women in Hungarian dance performance and the acceptance of non-Hungarian dancers in Hungarian dance communities.

The Forum continued after lunch with a special presentation by Vicky Wulff, a member of the Dance Heritage Coalition, a group whose aim is to set guidelines for the documentation and preservation of dance in the United States. Members of the Coalition are Margaret Norton, director of the San Francisco Performing Arts Library and Museum, Jeanne Newlin of the Harvard Theatre Collection, Madeleine Nichols of the New York Public Library's Dance Collection and Vicky Wulff, the dance librarian for the Library of Congress' Performance Library in Washington, D.C.

The World Dance Concert, perhaps the most spectacular feature of the Forum, was held at the conclusion of the Saturday schedule. With a full house, 8 performing groups (all affiliated with UCLA) displayed the mastery of their respective art forms. The show opened with the rhythmic footwork of UCLA's Mexican Groupo Folklorico and moved onto several Asian dance performances. These included an expressive Japanese Opera dance, a mystical Korean Salpuri dance, and a theatrical Indonesian mask dance. Dances from other areas included an East Indian Kathak dance, an improvatory Hungarian Transylvanian couple dance, an impromptu Brazilian Samba duet, and a finale number by Frances Awe's Nigerian Talking Drum Ensemble. The day was concluded with a special viewing of the multicultural exhibits in UCLA's Fowler Museum of Cultural History, followed by a wine and cheese reception held in the beautiful Fowler Courtyard. There, students, faculty and guest artists were given time to share their ideas concerning the future direction(s) of dance ethnology.

Sunday's schedule followed the same format at Saturdays, with paper presentations in the morning and exhibitions and panel discussions in the afternoon. Possibly the most exciting papers were presented on this day, with Anne von Bibra's discussion and live footage of "Use and abuse of folk dance under the Nazi regime", and Michelle Forner's presentation and hypnotic exhibition of "Oriental Belly Dance". This was followed, most appropriately, by 2 additional Middle Eastern dance exhibitions; one a riveting performance by Carolee Kent, a professional




Impromptu Brazilian Samba duet

dancer from Cairo, and a folk-style cane dance by Gigi deMarris, a Dance Ethnology student currently working on completing her Master's thesis. A Middle Eastern Dance panel followed, examining numerous socio-political and religious issues pertaining to the restoration and preservation of dance in the Middle East. many of the audience were very interested in the role that the Islamic faith plays regarding female "belly dancers" in the Middle East.

Wrapping up the forum was a closing discussion concerning the preservation, restoration and change of dance in the Los Angeles area. One of the major issues brought up regarded the involvement of dance communities in academic dance research projects. Members of the audience, representing various dance communities, expressed their eagerness to participate more in UCLA dance research projects, hoping to break the rift that currently exists between the academic and community contexts of dance. UCLA faculty and students were, in turn, most receptive to the idea of sharing their interest and work in dance with the local dance communities, particularly since it is most often the communities themselves that keep many dance traditions alive for future research.

Nomenclature

"Folk" is a much-maligned and misunderstood word. Some people confuse folkdance with square dance. For some, it implies "white and old". "Ethnic" implies "brown", and "World" implies "younger". The education field uses the term "multicultural" as a buzz-word, but they use it wrongly. What a mess! We need to clarify these terms for our own use and then make it known to the public.

General Principles

Get younger people! Couple dancing is popular! Have events for people of all ages. Successful groups seem to have a focus. Fulfill expectations. We need young, dynamic teachers. Federation should find facilities for dance, lobby for school facilities, network with other groups, act as a resource center.

Education

Another big topic, including philosophy of teaching in the revitalization concept, and use of schools, plus other ideas.

Teaching dancing, not dances. Teach how to dance and make it fun instead of teaching how to perform choreographies. Dance is not the memorization of thousands of patterns, but the free use of a few elements to create an experience. Teach dance well and have high standards. (Richard Duree is our Teacher Training Chair, and an excellent resource.)

Teachers

Find teachers of dance from other ethnic communities, ie, non-European (we already know those), such as Asian, South American, African, etc. Gema Sandoval of Plaza de la Raza is a source for Latin American dance.

Get teachers into private schools and day-care programs.

Have teacher institutes for Latin American and Asian dance.

Offer high schools curricula like "history through dance".

Teaching Tips

How to dress for dancing: safe, comfortable footwear, avoid shoulder pads, look good, dress up for ethnic events (they're usually in churches).

How to be a club leader.

How to lead lines and line etiquette.

How to lead (for men), partner etiquette.

Escort women to parking lots!!

Expanding Horizons

Encourage attendance at ethnic events (Greek festivals, of course, but there are also many others. It's fun to dance with real ethnics!). Learn firsthand about others' cultures. Also encourage attendance at ethnic music and dance concerts.

Miscellany

Give awards such as trophies and scholarship to meritorious students and present them at the Gala.

Create source lists to be the "yellow pages" of the Federation.

UCLA

Elsie Dunin, Department Chair at the UCLA Department of Dance, will be our mentor for folkdance there. She has the music collection. Rick Spear wants to create a new folkdance club on campus there. A faculty patron is required and must be paid a fee. We though of doing many different events and classes at UCLA and, depending on what was successful, transferring the methods to other colleges and universities. Richard Duree and Marvin Smith are going to work with Elsie on various projects.

Performing Groups

Performing companies need to be incorporated more into the action of the Federation, and the Federation needs to be very responsive to the needs of the professional ensembles. We now have a knowledge base for this among the officers et al of the Federation (Judith Plonas performs Morris dance, Richard Duree directs Dunaj, Preston Ashbourne is with Dunaj and Gypsy), so performers can feel welcome.

Federation should publish a glossy brochure advertising ALL ethnic dance companies.

A job for some one or a committee would be to solicit outside performing groups from other (ethnic) communities. If they join the Federation, they would get into the brochure as an extra perk.

Perpetual Revitalization

This committee should be a standing committee for two years or more. Then, perhaps under a different name, it should continue to be a "watchdog" for the Federation to insure ongoing participation in programs of outreach and keeping abreast of changes in society.

This report is, in itself, not "final", except for the first phase of revitalization. This is an ongoing process. We now need to analyze what we've learned and create projects and goals and recruit people to work on them.

The Folk Dance Federation of California, South's Video Committee

On December 5, 1981, Dave Slater, then President of the Federation, South, appointed an Ad Hoc Committee to study and recommend guidelines for a Videotape Committee and Library. There was a growing awareness of the necessity for a Video Library at the time.

Original members of the Ad Hoc Committee were Valerie Staigh (Chair), Dorothy Daw, Maria Reisch, Lila Aurich, and Ted Martin. Later (March '82), when the Video Committee was reorganized, Ted Martin served as its first chair. He prepared guidelines for the development and use of the Video Library, most of which remain in use today. They include:

- Tapes will not be loaned.
- 2) The Video Committee will arrange written agreements with the teachers, permitting videotaping of their dances for the Federation's library.
- 3) Videotapes in the library are intended for study and review, not entertainment.
- The committee should attempt to record more that one "dance through" or "performance" of a dance. Teaching and styling details should be included.
- 5) The standard Federation format will be VHS 2-hour tapes.

Initially, the committee had a very low budget and relied primarily on the use of private equipment (video camera, VCR, etc.). Now, there is a \$600 budget. During my chairmanship, the Federation allocated \$1,500 to purchase a modern video camera (2/91) with 2-hour batteries and a heavy-duty tripod with a 5-year warranty. This year, the committee was given \$250 to purchase a 4-head Magnavox VCR for double-taping. At this stage, the committee is equipped with modern machines and can do high quality taping.

In addition to modernizing the equipment, the committee has been cataloging all of the Federation's tapes. The Library grew so fast that cataloging threatened to become a huge job. Hours, if not days, were required to find any given dance in the Library. So, I started preparing a never-ending list of dances by name, teachers, and tapes. Bev Wilder of the University of the Pacific in Stockton shared his cataloging process with us, and we have used it ever since.

The Video Committee improved its standard through the last 5 years, largely thanks to Dorothy Daw. Later, Steve Davis joined the committee and professionally put all of the catalog into his computer, generating a comprehensive list of our holdings.

The generosity of the Folk Dance Federation and all of the efforts of the Committee will be in vain if our teachers don't take advantage of our Video Library. The experience of those who have used video to review and study dances before teaching them in their classes has shown that video can be an extremely valuable tool. It provides quick review, especially of stylistic and pattern detail. In this way, the videotapes can resolve controversies arising from different teacher's memories.




