I first tasted folk dance in the 60's when it was part of Phys Ed in high school and college. I am exceedingly grateful to the Federation for supporting and promoting folk dance, and enjoy contributing what energy I can spare from the dance floor! I began as the Pasadena Co-op's Federation representative, somehow that segued into the North/South Coordinator, and this year I have stepped in as the Scholarship Chair.

The folk dance community has lost another cherished member. Dorothy Daw passed away Sunday, February 1 after an all-too-short struggle against cancer. Some folk dancers have no idea of the depth of this loss to our community. Maybe you think of Dorothy as a nice person and a good folk dancer. That's true, but she was so much more.

Dorothy first began dancing in a Norwegian exhibition group in Long Beach in the early '60's. She soon was dancing at Silverado, where she began teaching, and where she met her beloved Tommy. Together they were members of the Gandy Dancers. They were married January 10, 1970, and remained deeply in love for the next 34 years.

In the early years, Tommy and Dorothy enjoyed water skiing and cross-country skiing. They also spent many happy times camping and backpacking with folkdance friends, and later, motor-homing to various folkdance events, as well as to Yellowstone, Orlando, Carlsbad, and Vancouver (where they saw a performance of Lado). Dorothy and Tommy dearly loved to travel. In addition to the usual destinations for Southern Californians, they visited England and Scotland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Poland, and Dorothy's favorite-Croatia. This is not surprising, since Dorothy's love of tamburitza music was legendary. In later years, they enjoyed cruising through the Panama Canal and across the Atlantic on the Queen Elizabeth II.

Luckily for us, Tommy did not mind sharing Dorothy with the folk dance community, which at times made huge demands of her. She was president of the Folk Dance Federation of California South for two terms. She was on numerous Statewide committees, and co-chaired them twice. Dorothy was on the committee for the San Diego Folk Dance Conference until the camp ended. More recently she was a member of the Committees for the North/South Folkdance Seminar and for Stockton Research.

For many years, Dorothy WAS the Research and Standardization Committee for the Federation – a committee of one. She is the reason so many dances were documented, both on paper and in video, so that they remain as the original teacher presented them. Teachers sent their notes to Dorothy, who spent endless hours formatting and correcting them, putting them into the exact vernacular we have all come to expect. If a teacher was better at teaching than notating, this involved watching videos dozens of times to help write the notes exactly. If the teacher's English was poor, or if the notes were drawn figures instead of words, this just meant a little more challenge for Dorothy. But the final product was always meticulously prepared, and available to all for the asking. Dorothy was the keeper of the Federation archives, both syllabi and videos. She was a real authority on different kinds of dance styling, and also on costuming.

Dorothy was so giving of her time and energy. Her dedication to the Folk Dance Federation and to the San Pedro Balkan Dancers (where she taught weekly), her enthusiasm for folk dancing, music and ethnic costuming, her knowledge of the history of folk dancing, her warmth and friendliness-there are many reasons to mourn the passing of Dorothy Daw. She will be sorely missed by her family (husband Tommy, daughter Pauletta, and granddaughter Charla), and by the entire folkdance community.

I became friends with Dorothy Singleton in October, 1963 at the Gandy Dancers where she started dancing in 1961. Dorothy and I had a few problems to overcome (we were going out with the same male folkdancers, neither of which we married), but we liked each other anyway.

In 1962, **Andor Czompo** taught the first Hungarian Suite at Gandys which attracted many young dancers. Twenty or so couples were on the floor at the Camellia Festival in Fresno. That *Erseksanad* costume with

Dorothy Daw

about 7 yards of skirt material, including bands of embroidered ribbon, plus blouse and vest - and that was just the woman's - started Dorothy on her quest of how to reproduce, with available materials, authentic folk costume design. Many of us haunted thrift stores for 100% cotton sheets for petticoats - polyester rose differently when one turned and was not authentically acceptable.

At first, it was cross-stitch with penelope cloth instead of counting threads for *Krakowiak* (Polish), *Kriszachok* (Byelorussia), *Beseda* (Czechoslovakia), *Yula* (Moldavia), and *Hoinyi Veiter* (Ukrainian). But with **Anita Wintheiser**, a professional seamstress, **Ruth Garber and Bob Bowley** on the costume committee also (I know there were more, but the historian books have been temporarily misplaced), new heights were reached on the yearly exhibition costume to insure their accuracy.

I remember painting wooden dowels black, and nailing filigree balls (blackened with paint to antique them) to make powder cartridges and meeting Dorothy down on Los Angeles Street to select appropriate black steer hides to be sewn into soft men's boots for **Vince Evanchuk's** Caucuses Mountain/Georgian Suite. With a hammer for flattening seams and a rolling presser foot, eureka! Then there was **Anthony Ivancich's** Canary Island/Isa Suite. There was no ready-made material for the skirts, and sewing flannel strips on dark cloth was quickly abandoned. Since a member of the group had taken (at some point) a weaving class, a loom was rented, set up in Long Beach, and many of us learned how to manage a shuttle as we weaved, under Dorothy's direction, 30 full length skirts, each 3 yards wide, in 3 different backgrounds. The other 10 pieces of the woman's costume I won't even mention. For Turkish, we 'distressed' perfectly good velvet by washing and made a fez with gold coins 'antiqued' with black paint.

The costumes became as challenging as the dances and kept us in such close contact with each other that, for our 'last hurrah' of the Gandy 50th Birthday and final get-together in 1998 (need I mention Dorothy and Tom were in charge of the committee and brought the records, tapes and equipment) in Long Beach, 70 people came even with the temperature almost 100 degrees and no air conditioning. We danced, we ate (Anthony barbecued a lamb), we talked and visited and danced some more, from 1 to around 9 that night. It was a fitting end for what was, to Dorothy and many of

us, over 40 years of folkdancing - participation, committees and offices in the Federation...

Dorothy wasn't always an easy person to be around. Her strive for excellence carried over into everything she did. I remember her at the Las Vegas Statewide correcting someone leading a dance. It never occurred to Dorothy the correction wouldn't be welcomed, even if it was made in front of many people. For Dorothy was a purist, a loyal friend, a perfectionist, a clown (on occasion), an earth mother to those in need and an eternal child. If you needed help, she was there for you. When she was going in for brain surgery last September, she said how relieved she was that she'd finished the Hess Kramer notes early so they wouldn't be inconvenienced by her surgery.

That was Dorothy.

But a personal memory I will always cherish was at the top of the Eiffel Tower during the Las Vegas Statewide as we watched (for the third time) the dancing waters at the Bellagio. Her face was pressed to the bars and she said, "Isn't it won..der..ful...." as only Dorothy could express that word. And I have to close this with...as were you, Dorothy, as were you.

It was to be a travel around the world for their graduation ceremonies. We were short of dancers, and Dorothy consented to travel from Long Beach where she resided with her mother at the time. She acted as our spokesperson and surprised me with the many accents she could conjure up to introduce the various parts of the show.

She was captivated by her work concerning dance and her sense of perfection pushed her to record and analyze the smallest details of the steps.

coordinating the dance selections, making the tape, choreographing the groups every move, selecting just the right costume and placement of each member. Many of the costumes were from her own collection which she generously lent to us for performances. She wanted the style and character of each culture to be honored with a professional effort by each one of her dancers.

Dorothy would conduct a mini fashion show at the event giving our audience information about all that they were seeing and our gorgeous costumes were appreciated by the sellout crowd. We always saved a place in our circle for Dorothy to perform in at least the finale number.

Dorothy was a friend to each member of our group and we could never thank her enough for all she did for us. She is terribly missed.

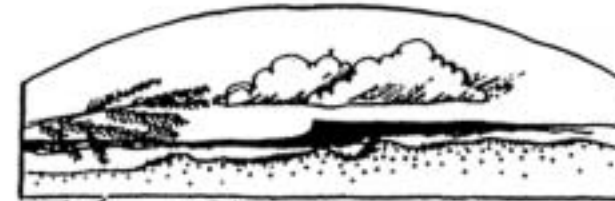
